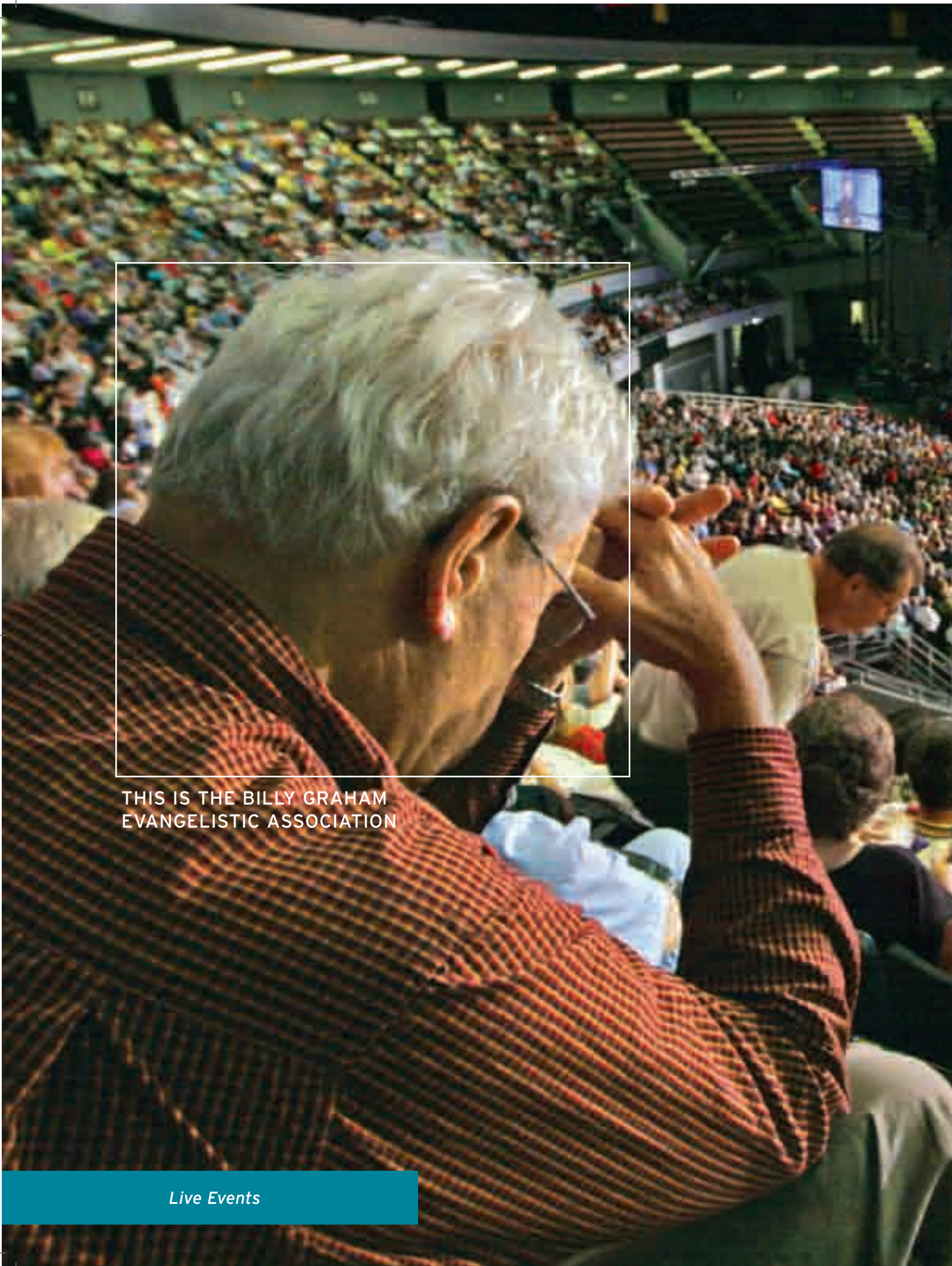


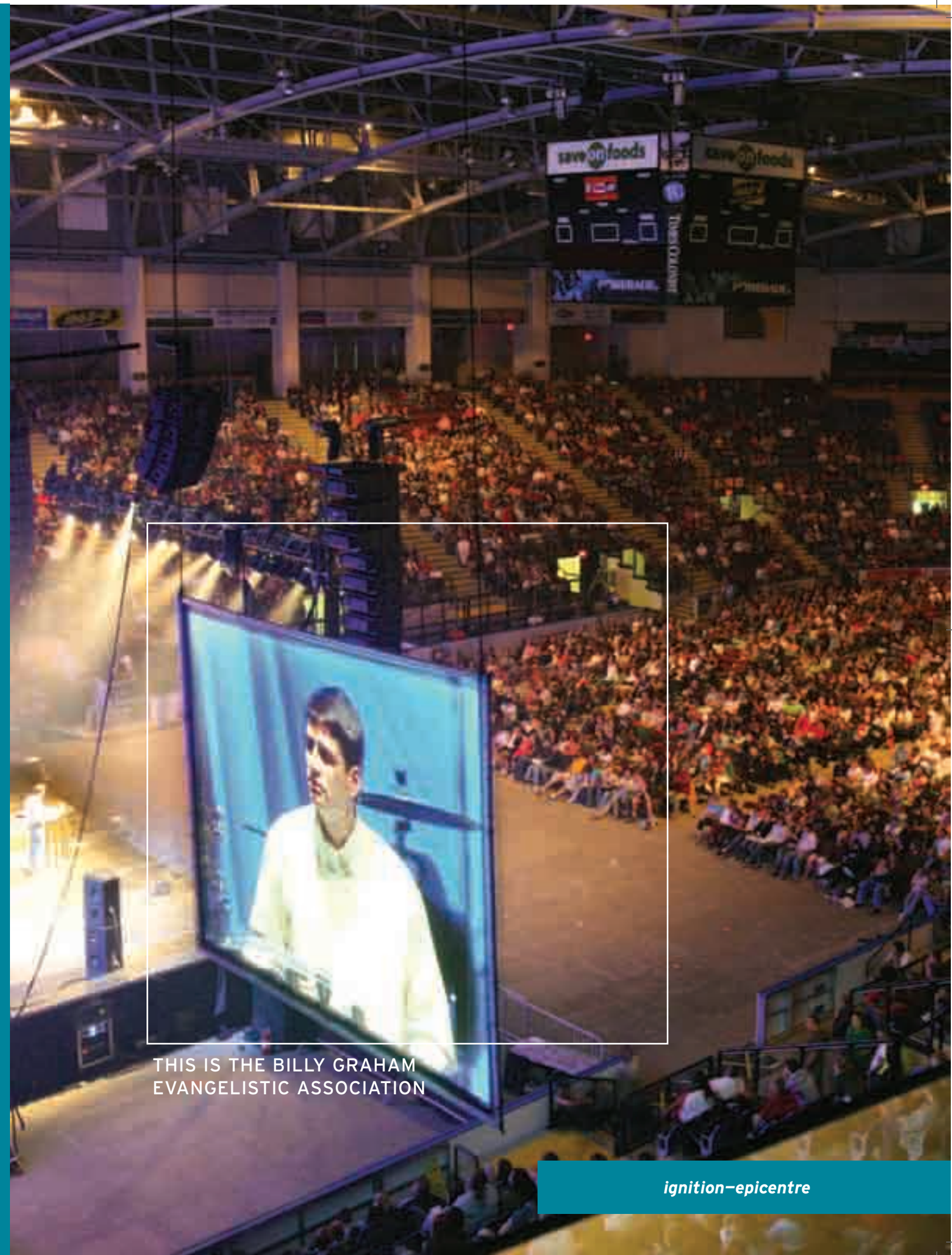

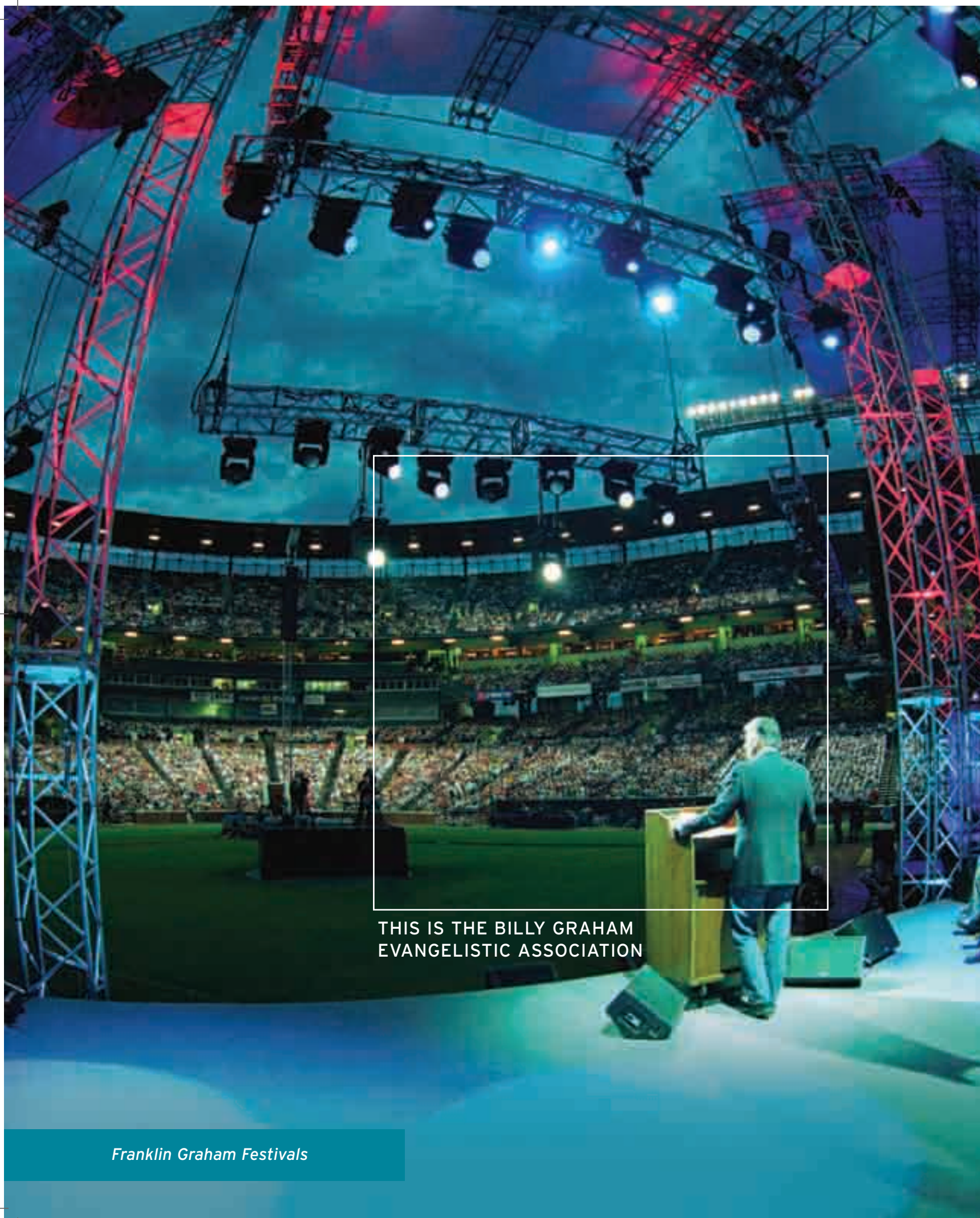
"Those who look to him are radiant; their faces are never covered with shame"

Franklin Graham Festivals

LIVE MINISTRY EVENTS

FRANKLIN GRAHAM FESTIVALS • In 2006, God was at work changing lives across the globe using Franklin Graham Festivals. Record-breaking crowds totalling more than 670,000 on three continents heard the Good News of Jesus Christ, and for the first time, Japanese-and English-speaking Christians in Okinawa joined together to reach their island for Christ. But the greatest records of 2006 are the 56,000 who formally pledged their lives to Christ—they are the men, women, and children God has changed forever by the saving power of Jesus Christ.



All of our major outreach events begin with local believers who are burdened for the salvation of their friends and neighbours. At the invitation of Christian leaders in a city, BGEA partners with churches for months of planning and training leading up to the three-day outreach. After the event, we assist the local body in following up with those who made decisions for Christ.

FACING THE SAVIOUR

During a follow-up phone call after the Festival in Mobile, Alabama, one woman said the event saved her life. Two and a half years earlier, her husband had died. When Hurricane Katrina struck months before the Festival, she lost her new boyfriend and several close friends. Dejected and hopeless, she was contemplating suicide. On the final evening she discovered something worth living for and came forward to give her heart to Jesus Christ.

Because these churches are a permanent part of their community, lives continue to be changed by the power of the Gospel long after the event is over.

The year began in the Philippines with the Metro Manila Festival—Franklin Graham's first in Asia and his largest to date. Over 317,000 people heard the Gospel, and more than 33,000 people made decisions for Jesus Christ. On Saturday morning, 82,500 kids and family members packed Rizal Park, breaking the record for the largest children's event ever held there.

In March, God brought a message of new life to a shattered city through the historic Celebration of Hope in New Orleans, Louisiana, and 1,365 people made public commitments to Christ.

Billy Graham toured ruined neighbourhoods with his son, offered encouragement to local pastors, and delivered Sunday's closing message. During the two-

day event at the city's Superdome, the Grahams reminded crowds that real hope is found only in Jesus.

Weeks later, inmates at what was once America's bloodiest prison heard a message of forgiveness and freedom. The Louisiana State Penitentiary at Angola is still a maximum-security prison, and many inmates are serving life sentences without the possibility of

parole. Before the Festival, Franklin Graham visited and prayed with the men on Death Row.

More than 300 churches prepared for the Gulf Coast Festival in Mobile, Alabama, overcoming racial barriers, as well as the physical trials brought on by hurricanes Ivan, Dennis, and Katrina. Franklin Graham spoke on the kind of relief that can only come from God, and hundreds put their trust in Christ.

In July, the Metro Maryland Festival was held in Oriole Park at Camden Yards in Baltimore, the only time in 2006 that this famed venue hosted a non baseball event. A record 81,000 people attended the Festival, and 3,255 made decisions for Christ. Billy Graham also made an appearance, preaching the sermon on the final day.

Next, Franklin Graham travelled to Quito, Ecuador, for *Festival de Esperanza* (Festival of Hope). More than 140,000 people attended the two-day Festival—the

country's largest ever evangelistic event—and broke the attendance record at Olympic Stadium.

In late fall, overflow crowds attended the Central Canada Festival in Winnipeg, Manitoba, each night, and more than 2,000 people responded to the call to follow Jesus.

The Okinawa Festival in Japan, the final event for 2006, marked the first time that local Japanese-speaking churches and international English-speaking churches joined together to reach out to the island with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Considering that less than one percent of the population of Japan is Christian and the average church has only 40 members, local organizers were astonished at the response to the Festival. More than 30,000 people turned out to hear the Gospel, and 1,784 people made decisions for Christ.

WILL GRAHAM CELEBRATIONS

In 2006, William Franklin "Will" Graham, IV, held his first large-scale evangelistic Crusade in the U.S. with the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association. Crowds totalling more than 12,600 attended the Greater Gaston Celebration in Gastonia, North Carolina. Will preached to an audience of 4,500 on the opening night, a record for the decades-old stadium. During the three-day Celebration, over 450 people came forward to make personal decisions for Jesus Christ. In Leduc, Alberta, 244 people came forward as Will preached at the Wild Rose Celebration. Later in the fall, more than 4,500 young people gathered in Victoria, British Columbia, to hear Will, and 264 came forward to pray with counsellors at *ignition*.



VIKTOR HAMM

In June, Christian leaders across the Ukraine joined BGEA of Canada evangelist Viktor Hamm in holding the Festival of Hope in the southwestern city of Chernovtsy. With overflow attendance during the three-day Festival, more than 44,000 people came to hear the Good News, and over 1,800 made personal decisions for Jesus Christ. At the sight of fellow Ukrainians finding new life in Christ, one attendee said, "It's a joy to see the happy faces of those who have found what they have been seeking for so long."

The event was held as part of year-long preparations for Franklin Graham's upcoming Festival in Ukraine, which will be held in the nation's capital, Kiev, in July 2007.



ROBERT CUNVILLE

In addition to his major responsibilities as chairman of *My Hope-India*, Robert Cunville held 14 evangelistic Festivals of Peace all across India—many in areas traditionally hostile to the Gospel. We praise God that over 691,000 people heard the Good News, and more than 41,000 made public commitments for Christ.

FACING THE SAVIOUR

A Ukrainian pastor went door to door in the days before the Viktor Hamm Festival of Hope, inviting people to the evangelistic outreach. One of those who agreed to come was his former teacher, an ardent atheist. During the days of Soviet rule, she regularly humiliated and even beat him and other Christian students for their faith. She came to the Festival, heard the Gospel, and surrendered her life to the Saviour she had spent her life denying. A few months later, she was baptized by her former student.

MY HOPE

WORLD EVANGELISM TELEVISION PROJECT • The *My Hope* World Evangelism Television Project is small group evangelism on a massive, nationwide scale, modeled after the Apostle Matthew, who invited many friends into his house to meet the Saviour. Last year, Christians in Mexico, the Philippines, and India became “Matthews” as they

received evangelistic training from BGEA and—with much prayer—invited friends into their homes to watch special TV programs featuring Gospel messages by Billy or



Franklin Graham. Praise God that more than 3.7 million individuals have recorded decisions for Jesus Christ. In Mexico, over 20,000 partner churches from every state in the country trained nearly 261,000 congregants for this relationship-evangelism outreach. Many of these believers,



FACING THE SAVIOUR

Struggling through a difficult marriage, 29-year-old Maricel had considered taking her children and leaving her husband. Before she could, the couple accepted a neighbour's invitation to watch one of our *My Hope* programs. That night's broadcast across the Philippines featured a story about a woman who finds strength in the midst of her adultery-torn marriage by turning to Jesus Christ. Maricel and her husband, touched by Franklin Graham's message recorded at the Manila Festival, gave their hearts to the Saviour—along with eight other guests. Within days, Maricel reported that her marriage was saved and the family restored.

eager to share their faith, did not wait for the *My Hope* broadcasts to tell their loved ones and neighbours about Christ.

One small church in Mexico City grew by almost one-third, weeks before the broadcasts even began. The church, having limited resources, tore down the back wall of their sanctuary to accommodate the overflow crowd.

By God's grace, our team was able to buy airtime on one of Mexico's most powerful TV networks. One *My Hope* host marveled, "I never thought that they'd broadcast a national program like this. ... We've never had anything like this in Mexico before."

More than 433,000 Mexicans responded to the Gospel and committed their lives to Jesus Christ.

The *My Hope*-Philippines initiative grew out of the

Franklin Graham Metro Manila Festival in February as Christian leaders across the island nation wanted to see more of their country come to Christ.

Just weeks before the telecasts, two powerful typhoons hit the central Philippines, killing hundreds, destroying electrical grids, and demolishing thousands of houses. One pastor in a region devastated by the final typhoon showed a *My Hope* video on CD (VCD) in public settings because he had access to only one generator. Over 70 people made decisions for Christ in one evening.

But God was faithful, and *My Hope* programs were broadcast on more than 100 local stations, which covered most of the nation. In addition, over 80,000 DVDs and VCDs were distributed to pastors prior to the telecasts to ensure that people on every island

had an opportunity to hear the Gospel. Churches across the nation recorded more than 528,000 total decisions for Christ.

Following previous successful *My Hope* efforts in India, BGEA decided to carry out a third outreach there at Christmas.

Through broadcasts in 11 languages on 69 networks, *My Hope* programs saturated India's airwaves with the Good News of Jesus Christ for three days.

In some areas, participating Christians willingly faced severe religious persecution for the joy of

seeing others find new life in Jesus, and extremists burned several partner churches to the ground. Four *My Hope* regional coordinators were beaten and another shot to death because he refused to stop teaching Christians how to win others to Christ. In eastern and central India, pastors in remote villages were beaten or killed by radicals.

God showed that His love and power are greater than any rival, and in 2006, over 2.7 million Indian people made commitments to the One who gives hope beyond the trials of this life.

COMFORT IN TIMES OF CRISIS

RAPID RESPONSE TEAM AND WORLD EMERGENCY FUND

RAPID RESPONSE TEAM

The Rapid Response Team was formed after the terrorist attacks of 9/11 to offer the compassion of Jesus Christ during times of crisis or natural disaster. Volunteer chaplains with the Rapid Response Team comfort and pray with victims, local pastors, and first-responders (firefighters, police, paramedics, etc).

Last year 1,776 chaplains from 37 states were deployed to the U.S. Gulf Coast in our continuing ministry to the region after Hurricane Katrina. Between August 12 and September 18, BGEA sent 97 chaplains to Binghamton, New York, after the region suffered the worst flooding in nearly 30 years. In total, more than 2,600 people made life-changing decisions to follow Jesus Christ after speaking with Rapid Response Team chaplains.

This year the BGEA of Canada offered Rapid Response Team training in Calgary, Alberta and 77 people participated.

WORLD EMERGENCY FUND

Established in 1973, the World Emergency Fund has shared the compassion of Christ through physical and spiritual relief with multitudes around the world in the midst of crisis. During 2006, the World Emergency

Amar was at church when the South Asian tsunami hit his village on December 26, 2004. Though he used to worship other gods, 19 years ago Amar came to faith in Christ, and his life was changed forever. As the first Christians in his village, Amar's family faced persecution from their neighbours, but after the devastating tsunami and BGEA's work to rebuild his village, many hearts are now open to the Gospel message. "It is the Christians who are reaching out to our needs, and we tell [the other villagers] it is because of the love of Christ," Amar says. The number of Christians in the village has grown steadily, and approximately 50 families now have the peace that comes from knowing Christ.



Fund continued to minister to people in areas ravaged by the 2004 tsunami in South Asia and by hurricanes along the U.S. Gulf Coast.

BGEA's work to rebuild a fishing village in India, newly named the Village of Hope, is nearing completion, and many homes that were damaged or destroyed by the tsunami have been rebuilt. Hundreds of patients from nearby villages were treated in the medical clinic, and children from miles around were educated in the village school. This previously under-developed area is now thriving with residents who are grateful for their new community.

YOUTH MINISTRIES

epicentre, DARE TO BE A DANIEL

In 2006, we continued our focus on communicating the Gospel to youth and young adults.

Our growing **epicentre** program was implemented in Victoria in 2006. This initiative involves a 10- to 12-month commitment to work with youth and community groups, leaders, and young people, with the goal of deepening existing relationships with Christ and reaching those who are searching with the Gospel message.

In 2006 a new phase of **epicentre** took flight called **global velocity**. This is a program for young people who have been involved in the **epicentre** process. The goal is to involve youth in cross-cultural missions. A group of 20 young people spent 10 days ministering and learning in Trinidad and Tobago.

We also launched our youth evangelism training ministry, Dare to Be a Daniel, to help equip young people to stand for Christ and share their faith with others. Based on the life of Daniel in the Old Testament, the program encourages students to obey God, pray and study His Word, pick godly friends, and point others to Jesus.

Dare to Be a Daniel consists of a website—daretobeadaniel.com—and a printed booklet with a CD-ROM. More than 223,000 booklets and CD-ROMs were ordered in Canada and the U.S., and thousands of young people completed the program.

Daretobeadaniel.com offers students exclusive, members-only resources, including spiritually encouraging videos, articles, and an online message board. Since its launch in May, more than 5,600 individuals have registered, and people have visited the site over 158,000 times.

When Margaret heard about **ignition** with Will Graham, she knew this would be a fantastic opportunity for her troubled granddaughter Jennifer to hear the Gospel in a way she could relate to. “I had no expectations at all because Jennifer had been resentful and angry,” said Margaret. So when Jennifer turned to Margaret and said she wanted to go forward at the invitation to accept Christ as Lord and Saviour, Margaret was amazed. “From now on there’s someone who loves you no matter what,” Margaret told her granddaughter afterwards. “You’re the daughter of the King.”

THE BILLY GRAHAM TRAINING CENTER, CHRISTIAN LIFE & WITNESS COURSE, AND SCHOOLS OF EVANGELISM

THE BILLY GRAHAM TRAINING CENTER AT THE COVE

Long before the Billy Graham Training Center at The Cove was built on 1,500 acres of mountainside near Asheville, North Carolina, Billy and Ruth Graham laid the foundation with prayer. They asked God for a retreat where believers could be trained in His Word to win others to Christ.

Their prayers continue to be answered today as guests come from around the world to hear premier Christian speakers, worship and fellowship with other believers, and be refreshed by God in the splendour of His creation.

In 2006, over 21,000 guests attended life-changing seminars and other group ministry opportunities at The Cove, and more than 800 made commitments to Jesus Christ.

FACING THE SAVIOUR

During a seminar at The Cove, Caroline and her husband went to a training session on sharing their faith. Caroline's thoughts turned to her mother, who had long been resistant to the Gospel, and she felt a strong conviction to share what she learned with her mother. When the couple arrived home, Caroline began to read through the booklet with her mother. Before she could finish, her mother was in tears. Within an hour of returning home from their retreat at The Cove, Caroline had led her mother to the Lord Jesus Christ.



COUNSELLING AND FOLLOW-UP

Our Counselling and Follow-Up ministry trained nearly 50,000 individuals in North America for personal evangelism through our Christian Life and Witness Course (CLWC) in 2006, and during the course, over 4,500 made commitments to Christ. An integral part of any major outreach, over 23,900 of these CLWC graduates served as volunteer counsellors during Franklin Graham Festivals, Will Graham Celebrations, and other events, and they helped lead 58,667 individuals in making personal decisions for Jesus Christ.

BILLY GRAHAM SCHOOLS OF EVANGELISM

Through intensive conference-style training, Schools of Evangelism (SOEs) equip pastors, church leaders, and their spouses to lead congregations in reaching their communities for Jesus Christ.

More than 15,000 people attended Schools of Evangelism and similar training sessions in Canada, the U.S., Ecuador, Panama, Paraguay, and Ukraine last year. Pastors in Quebec were encouraged by the SOE that was held in Mont Tremblant in November.

Television Broadcasts

MEDIA EVANGELISM

RADIO, TELEVISION, AND FILM

TELEVISION



Last year we aired seven prime-time television specials on broadcast network affiliates or Christian cable networks across North America. Our 2006 programs featured messages from Billy and Franklin Graham, musical performances, and powerful testimonies. These programs reached into an estimated 9.9 million homes with the life-changing news of Jesus Christ. Thousands more heard the Gospel through weekly broadcasts

of classic Billy Graham Crusades on TBN. After watching BGEA programs, more than 26,000 people called our phone centres to make decisions for Jesus Christ and pray with operators who are trained much like counsellors at BGEA events. Over 130,200 requested the free Gospel book offered during the TV special.

RADIO

In 2006, *The Hour of Decision* radio program was played over 140 times per week across Canada. The shorter *Decision Minute* program aired more than 770 times each week on radio stations across Canada. Both *The Hour of Decision* and *Decision Minute* represent our commitment to provide Canadians across the country with opportunities to hear about and respond to the spiritual calling that God has placed in the heart of each person.

INTERNATIONAL FILM MINISTRY

BGEA's evangelistic films are being used in dozens of countries to share the Good News of Christ, and during 2006, we expanded our international distribution of these evangelistic movies into Germany, Cambodia, Mexico, Nigeria, and the Netherlands.

Last year, films were broadcast on TV in Guatemala, South Korea, and a number of countries in Europe and Africa. Several movies aired the message of Jesus Christ to the Middle East, reaching Egypt, Jordan, Syria, Lebanon, and Turkey. We know of at least 35,110 decisions for Christ recorded around the world through this film ministry in 2006, but only God knows the full harvest of these seeds sown for the Gospel.

FACING THE SAVIOUR

A 21-year-old called in after a BGEA telecast and shared that both of his parents were atheists and he had never been in a church or read a Bible. After a lawn-mower accident three weeks prior, he had lost half of his foot and was battling with severe depression. After flipping through channels, he stopped on a telecast from Billy Graham's 1971 Chicago Crusade and was moved to pray. That evening the young man accepted Christ into his heart and acknowledged Him as Lord and Saviour.

DECISION MAGAZINE, TVTM, AND INTERNET

DECISION MAGAZINE

For 47 years, *Decision* magazine has been proclaiming Good News in print and helping readers grow in their faith. During 2006, BGEA produced more than 6.7 million copies of *Decision*, and it was distributed in 97 countries in three languages. Canadian articles explored issues of faith from the perspectives of a scientist and musicians. Major Canadian outreach events were also featured.

TELEVISION TELEPHONE MINISTRY

The Television Telephone Ministry (TVTM) provides support for Canadian broadcast specials in the form of call-centre counselling. TVTM volunteers in Calgary, Alberta, Winnipeg and Grunthal, Manitoba, had the opportunity to lead 250 people to Christ this past year. An additional 714 calls were answered related to assurance, rededication, and other needs.

INTERNET

BGEA of Canada has begun designing and building a full-service website that will make the best of evangelism resources available for use in Canadian context.

FACING THE SAVIOUR

A young woman grew up watching Billy Graham on TV and longed for a relationship with God. After years of searching, she again felt God pulling at her heart. She was wary of visiting a church, and God drew her to the BGEA website. Encouraged to learn more, she soon began attending a church close to her home. Six weeks later, the woman came to faith in Jesus Christ. "I am not sure that I would ever have made that step if ... your organization did not have this website," she wrote.

OUR FINANCIAL COMMITMENT TO YOU

- We subscribe to a written statement of faith clearly affirming our commitment to the evangelical Christian doctrine. Advancing the Gospel of Jesus Christ is the singular objective of our financial conduct.
- We are governed by a Board of Directors. Our full Board meets at least two times annually to establish policies, set budgets, oversee operations, and review ministry accomplishments.
- Our financial statements are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. We obtain an annual audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards by an independent public accounting firm.
- Our Board appoints an audit committee to review the annual audit and report its findings to the Board.
- We seek to conduct our activities with the highest standards of integrity and to avoid conflicts of interest. Because we believe that it is God's place to prompt a response to our fundraising appeals, we shun high-pressure or manipulative fundraising tactics.
- Our fundraising appeals clearly identify the purpose and programs to which donations will be applied, and we ensure that donations are used for the purposes for which they were raised. Occasionally, we receive more contributions for a given project than can be wisely applied to that project. When that happens, we use these funds to meet a similar pressing need. Our policy is to meet the needs God lays before us, so that Christ is lifted up and the Gospel advanced.
- Contributions to the ministry are tax-deductible to the full extent allowed by law.
- We will not operate this ministry with indebtedness that dishonours the cause of Christ and hinders the work of the Gospel.

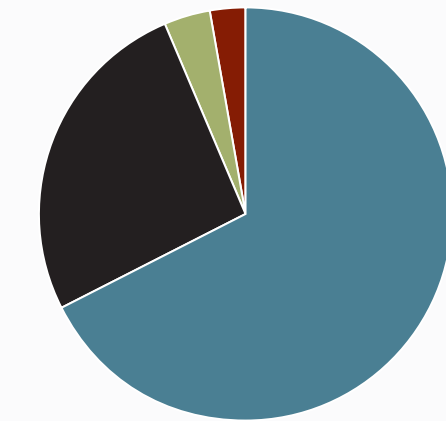

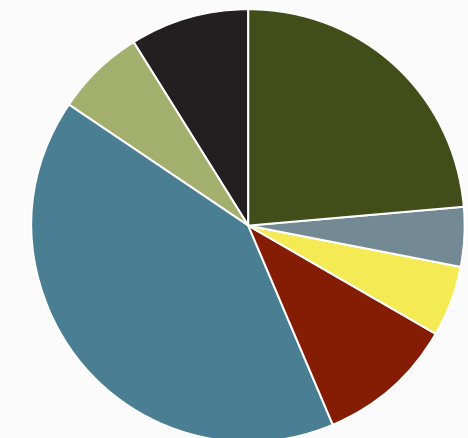

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 2006

1. NATURE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The mission of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association of Canada ("the Canadian Association") is to support the calling and ministries of Billy Graham and Franklin Graham by proclaiming the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ to all we can by every effective means available to us and by equipping others to do the same. Support is received from individual donors through contributions, deferred giving programs and evangelistic activities. The Canadian Association is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and accordingly is exempt from income taxes.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Canadian Association follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions. Fund balances consist of:

Unrestricted Funds

Represent funds which are fully available to the Canadian Association, at the discretion of management and the Board of Directors, to utilize in any of its programs or supporting services.

Property and Equipment

Represents the assets, liabilities and expenses related to the Canadian Association's property and equipment.

Temporarily Restricted Funds

Comprised of funds that are restricted by donors for specific purposes (such as World Emergency Fund and youth concerts) or time periods. The related income may be expended for such purposes as specified by the donor, or if none, then for any purpose of the Canadian Association.

Permanently Restricted Funds

Include contributions that donors have specified must be maintained in perpetuity.

Cash Equivalents

Consist of highly liquid investments with a maturity of one year or less.

Property and Equipment

Purchased property and equipment are recorded at cost. Contributed property and equipment are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution. Amortization of property and equipment is recorded using the straight line method over their estimated useful

lives as follows:

Building	40 years
Furniture and equipment	3 to 8 years
Automobile	5 years

Revenue Recognition

Revenues for contributions are recorded on a cash basis. The Canadian Association is the beneficiary under various wills and trust agreements. The Canadian Association records such bequests when proceeds to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably certain.

Decision Magazine

The subscription price of *Decision* magazine is charged to unearned subscriptions and is amortized to income over a 12-month period following receipt. *Decision* magazine is also given to donors who make a contribution to the Canadian Association. The cost to fulfill this gift subscription is accrued as a liability and amortized to expense over a 12-month period.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates that affect the accounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from the estimates.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments include cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, current ministries' long-term investments, a loan to a related organization, accounts payable and amounts due to an affiliated organization. The fair value of the Canadian Association's financial assets and liabilities approximate their carrying value. It is management's opinion that the Canadian Association is not exposed to significant interest or credit risk arising from these financial instruments.

The Canadian Association is exposed to foreign currency fluctuations in relation to its transactions with its U.S. affiliate (note 7).

Pension Plan

Contributions by Billy Graham Evangelistic Association of Canada toward the employee registered retirement savings plans vary from 7% to 8.75% of eligible gross salaries depending on the employee eligibility and participation in the plan.

3. EXPENSE ALLOCATIONS

Certain expenses of the Canadian Association relate to both ministries and support services. The allocation of these joint costs is based on estimates of the content and purpose of the expenditures. Total joint costs and respective allocations are as follows:

During the year, amortization in the amount of \$113,214 (2005-\$84,056) was charged to operations.

6. DEFERRED GIVING PROGRAM AND CHANGE IN FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

The Canadian Association has a fully funded program whereby revocable deferred gifts can be made through trust fund participation. These trust funds are held and managed by the Canadian Association. At December 31, 2006, \$2,124,574 (\$2,089,856 in 2005) were held under this program. As these funds are revocable, they have not been reflected as assets of the Canadian Association.

Prior to 2006 these funds and the related liabilities were reflected on the Statement of Financial Position of the Canadian Association. 2005 comparative figures have been reclassified to reflect this change in presentation.

7. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Canadian Association loaned \$2,750,000 to The Samaritan's Purse - Canada ("Samaritan's Purse") in 2003 to fund Samaritan's Purse's share of the costs of the land and building. The loan is to a maximum of \$3,220,000 and bears interest at the Royal Bank of Canada one-year GIC interest rate plus 1% per annum, matures on December 31, 2013, and is collateralized by a carried interest in the land and building. Annual non-specified installments commenced December 31, 2004. Interest is payable annually. During 2006, the Canadian Association received a principal repayment of \$250,000 (\$250,000 in 2005) and interest of \$50,750 (\$57,038 in 2005) from Samaritan's Purse.

As at December 31, 2006 the amount payable to Samaritan's Purse was \$16,384 (2005-\$33,762). These amounts are subject to normal trade terms as per the cost-sharing agreement between the parties, and are included in the accounts payable and accrued liabilities balance.

The Canadian Association is affiliated with Billy Graham Evangelistic Association ("BGEA") located in Charlotte, North Carolina. BGEA provides television production, development, and response centre support services to the Canadian Association. The Canadian Association is billed for these services at cost. These and other services provided by BGEA to the Canadian Association amounted to approximately \$312,146 in 2006 (2005-\$290,000). As at December 31, 2006 the amount payable to BGEA was \$168,394 (2005-\$302,276) payable. These amounts are subject to normal trade terms, arose in the normal course of daily operations of the Canadian Association, and are included in the "payable to affiliated organization" balance.
